



Today's Fort Clatsop, located in the [Lewis and Clark National Historical Park](#), sits among a thick forest of immense Sitka spruce, western cedar, and Douglas fir, as well as hemlock, Oregon grape, sword fern, and huckleberry bushes—all in all, [250 species of plants](#). Flat, easy hiking trails weave under canopies of tree boughs throughout the

• **June 7, 14, 21, and 28**

(Wednesdays): The Mouth of the Platte Study Group meets on these days from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. (Central Time) at Our Savior's Lutheran Church, 600 Bluff Street, Council Bluffs, Iowa. This is an open meeting for anyone with an interest in the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Coffee and treats are provided.

The first hour is a time of sharing Lewis and Clark experiences by each participant. The second hour is devoted to reading and discussing entries in *The Definitive Journals of Lewis and Clark - Volume 6* edited by Gary Moulton.

In this month's readings, the study group remains with the Corps of Discovery at Fort Clatsop, where the explorers are hunting, updating their journals, making clothing and moccasins, investigating the culture of local natives, making salt, and generally preparing for their return to their beloved United States.

From 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., volunteers of the Living History Corps will portray members of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, giving live demonstrations about the duties and skills of the explorers: blacksmithing, musket shooting, hide scraping, and more.

The re-enactors also tell stories of daily life during the 1,119 days the explorers were on their journey from 1803 to 1806. As part of the free festivities during the monthly “Saturday with a Solider” event, kids can dress up in look-alike uniforms and try their hand at tomahawk throwing. 

- **June 11 (Sunday):** Author Alix Christie will read from her book, *The Shining Mountains*, at Travelers’ Rest State Park Visitor Center near Missoula, Montana. Alix’s book is based on the true story of Angus McDonald, the younger brother of her great-great-grandfather Duncan McDonald.

The story focuses on a hugely important period in American history and is described through the eyes of the real actors in the drama. The story of Angus, his Nez Perce wife Catherine, and their son Duncan illuminates a little-known history that stretches from the [Highland Clearances](#) to the extraordinary lives of the mainly Scottish traders in the Hudson’s Bay Company who forged alliances with North America’s indigenous tribes.



About part of her process of writing the book, Alix says, “To tell the story of the McDonald family, I consulted extensively with the Native communities about whom I write. I sought and received formal approval from both the Nez Perce and Confederated Salish

and Kootenai tribes. Elders from each tribe read and approved the manuscript. From the start, I have had the strong support of my distant cousins by marriage on the Flathead Reservation in Montana, who are direct descendants of the protagonists of the novel. They agree that the story of their blended family is an important –and heretofore missing– piece of the history of the American West."

Alix's presentation begins at 3 p.m. (Mountain Time). She will be available to sign books at the event.

- **June 19-June 23 (Monday-Friday):** Here's an opportunity for youngsters ages 9 to 11 to join the Lewis and Clark Expedition and become full-fledged members of the Junior Explorers. During this week of events of education and fun, the youngsters will learn the history of the Lewis and Clark Expedition by "training" at Camp River Dubois near Hartford, Ill. Camp River Dubois was the expedition's first winter encampment.

The first winter encampment is commemorated by an interpretive center and replica log cabins at the Lewis & Clark State Historic Site, where youngsters will learn about frontier skills, what it was like to serve in the U.S. Army, as many of the Lewis and Clark explorers did, and how to prepare their own food, make a journal, mend uniforms, identify native plants and animals, and many more tasks.

The program, which costs \$65, is offered through the [Lewis & Clark Community College's](#) College for Kids, an academic enrichment program for children of all ages. 


The festival offers many fun and educational interpretive displays and talks that focus on the times of Lewis and Clark. Here are

The Boat House and Museum operates under the theme of "Bringing History to Life, where the Discovery Expedition

Continues." It has been visited by more than 600,000 people in the last two decades, as well as 110,000 students who have taken field trips there.

The Boat House and Museum offers remarkable educational exhibits that tell the story of the Lewis and Clark Expedition. Meanwhile, the Boat House and Museum has a traveling fleet of replicas of the boats used by the explorers; the fleet visits places throughout the Midwest. The story of the Lewis and Clark Expedition is told by members of the Discovery Expedition of St. Charles, dedicated volunteers who are experienced re-enactors who portray expedition members.



- **July 31 (Monday):** This is the last day of the "Reimagining America: The Maps of Lewis and Clark" traveling exhibit at the Living Area Chamber of Commerce in Livingston, Montana.

The exhibit explains how the Lewis and Clark Expedition's findings transformed Euro-American understandings of North America in the early 1800s. It also investigates methods used by the explorers to gather and process that information, including preexisting maps, navigational scientific equipment that was considered cutting edge for its time, and intelligence gained from Native Americans whom the explorers interacted with.

"Reimagining America" was created by the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation to increase awareness of the story of the nation's geographic understanding of itself and the different cultural viewpoints and strategies that enabled Lewis and Clark to map and share their data. at tomahawk throwing. Parents: great photo opportunities! The “Saturday with a Soldier” events are held on the second Saturday from April through October. For more info, click on the highlighted visitor center link above or call 402-874-9900.

- **August 19 (Saturday):** If he were alive today, Sergeant Charles Floyd, the only person to die during the Lewis and Clark Expedition, would likely be the first in line to compete in today’s Sergeant Floyd Memorial Black Powder Muzzle-loader Shootout in Sioux City, Iowa.

The shootout is scheduled to coincide with a weekend of events that mark the anniversary of Sergeant Floyd’s death and burial on August 20, 1804, on a river bluff in what would become Sioux City. The shootout is hosted by the [Sgt. Floyd Tri-State Chapter](#) of the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation and the local [Hawkeye Rifle and Pistol Club](#).

The shootout will be held in two sessions. For the first session, the sign-in and practice will start at 9 a.m., with the competition beginning at 11 a.m. The second session will begin with sign-in and practice starting at 1 p.m. and competition at 3 p.m. The event will be held at the Hawkeye Rifle and Pistol Club’s outdoor shooting range, 2240 Allison Ave.

The event’s purpose is to highlight the history of the Lewis and Clark Expedition during its time in the Sioux City area and to raise funds for current and future projects related to the expedition’s history.


The shootout will be near the annual Sergeant Floyd Memorial Encampment on August 19 and August 20 at the Sergeant Floyd River Museum and Welcome Center. See the calendar entry below for information about the encampment.

- **August 19-20 (Saturday):** In Sioux City, Iowa, the annual Sergeant Floyd Memorial Encampment will be held at the Sergeant Floyd River Museum and Welcome Center, 1000 Larsen Park Road.

The encampment gives visitors the opportunity to explore an 1804 living-history camp that replicates the Lewis and Clark Expedition’s stay in the riverside area of what would become Sioux City. - **August 19 (Saturday):** As a way to honor Sergeant Charles Floyd and the Lewis and Clark Expedition, historical re-enactors in full-dress uniforms will re-create the burial of Sergeant Floyd, the only expedition member to die during the journey from 1803 to 1804.

In this annual ceremony, Sergeant Floyd Honor Guard re-enactors will perform the ceremony from 6 p.m. to 7 p.m. at the [Floyd's Monument](#), 2601 South Lewis Boulevard, Sioux City, Iowa.

The public is encouraged to bring lawn chairs to this annual event because seating is limited.

The free event is sponsored by the [Sioux City Public Museum](#) and [Sergeant Floyd River Museum and Welcome Center](#). It will be held in conjunction with the Sergeant Floyd Memorial encampment—see the calendar entry above for information about the encampment.

Who was Sergeant Floyd?

He joined the Lewis and Clark Expedition on August 1, 1803, and, by all accounts, was knowledgeable, responsible, and dependable. He was appointed one of the expedition's three sergeants on April 1, 1803.

Sergeant Floyd took ill on July 30, 1804, as the explorers moved up the Missouri River toward the area of what is now Sioux City, Iowa. He passed away, according to William Clark's journal, with a great deal of composure. He was buried on August 20 on what the explorers named Floyd's Bluff.

Medical experts today believe he probably suffered from a ruptured appendix with resultant peritonitis.

- **August 28 (Monday):** The traveling exhibit "Reimaging America: The Maps of Lewis and Clark" will be displayed until September 30 at [Ponca State Park](#), Ponca, Neb.

The exhibit explains how the Lewis and Clark Expedition's findings transformed Euro-American understandings of North America in the early 1800s. It also investigates

methods used by the explorers to gather and process that information, including preexisting maps, navigational scientific equipment that was considered cutting edge for its time, and intelligence gained from Native Americans whom the explorers interacted.

“Reimagining America” was created by the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation to increase awareness of the story of the nation’s geographic understanding of itself and the different cultural viewpoints and strategies that enabled Lewis and Clark to map and share their data. A Spotlight On:

Steve Ludeman: Artistic imagination, beauty and Lewis and Clark

When you attend the June annual meeting of members of the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation, plan to spend time viewing member Eastern Legacy artwork by member Steve Ludeman. The artwork will be on exhibit at the Holiday Inn Downtown Missoula, where most members will be staying and most sessions will be held. The exhibit of his Lewis and Clark Eastern Legacy paintings completed so far will be available from June 28 to June 30.

Steve is a watercolor and mixed media artist who is about halfway through a 4-year project that depicts Lewis and Clark history and the expedition's time in what has become known as the Eastern Legacy. The Eastern Legacy stretches about 1,400 miles from Pittsburgh, Pa., along the Ohio River, up the Mississippi River and to the Mississippi's confluence with the Missouri River.

When completed, Steve's project—titled "An Artist's View - The Eastern Legacy of the Lewis & Clark Expedition"—will be a series of 22 original drawings and paintings.

A few artists have created exceptional paintings that depict scenes along the Eastern Legacy, but Steve will be the first to tell the entire story of the expedition's time in the Eastern Legacy through art.

"My mission is to inform and educate the general public about this compelling and important chapter of the Corps of Discovery story," Steve says. "My goal is to create a traveling exhibit of 22 paintings and drawings. In 2024-25, the exhibit will be available to tour sites along the Lewis & Clark National Historic Trail." The Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation is working with him on his goal.

After the 2022 annual meeting in Pittsburgh, Steve and his wife Jean took their time returning to their home in Welches, Oregon. The couple traveled along the Ohio River so they could study Lewis and Clark sites to be included in Steve's project.

His works of art start with the construction of the main boat in Pittsburgh. Then comes a painting of the departure and next, a painting of the expedition's approach to Brunot's Island, then a painting of the episode on the island when a woman was nearly killed by the accidental misfire of Meriwether Lewis' air rifle.

Among the other artwork completed so far—nine paintings—is the cabin of George Rogers Clark near the Falls of the Ohio, where Lewis and William Clark met up, and a painting of the three expedition vessels from a scenic overlook next to Fort Kaskaskia, Ill., where Lewis and Clark recruited 12 soldiers to join the expedition. The completed paintings have been exhibited at several venues from Pittsburgh to Portland, Oregon.

Steve and Jean will be at the annual meeting. Give them a hearty greeting!

Sign up for a magical journey through the White Cliffs

Once again, the Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation and two other organizations are offering a canoe trip in July through the beautiful White Cliffs of the Missouri River in Montana.

The river trip goes through a remote area where the air is pure, and journeyers spend their days in canoes and time on shore full of hiking, reading Lewis and Clark's journals, and enjoying evening campfires.

The non-profit [Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation](#) and [its Portage Route River Chapter](#) in Great Falls, Montana, as well as the [Montana River Outfitters](#), are sponsoring the event from July 10 to July 14, which includes the canoe trip and tours of historic sites.

During the days of canoeing, tents with cots and sleeping pads will be set up ahead of your arrival. Meals will be prepared by outfitters. All of this will allow you time for hiking, exploring, campfire chats, wildlife and bird watching, fishing, taking photographs, and reading Lewis and Clark's journals. The trip will be led by guides knowledgeable about the country and its history.

The tours:

After completing the river journey, you will spend half of the day on July 13 at the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center in Great Falls. The center has magnificent displays that tell the expedition's story. After the center visit, there will be a trip to the First Peoples Buffalo Jump, an archaeologically important Montana state park and National Historic Landmark believed to be North America's largest bison cliff jump.


On July 14, weather permitting, you will tour the Two Medicine Fight Site, where Meriwether Lewis and three companions had a bitter encounter with Native Americans that ended in a fatality, possibly two. The site is on the National Register of Historic Places. The tour will be narrated by Larry Epstein, who was instrumental in locating the site.

White Cliffs: "Most romantic appearance"

When Lewis and Clark entered the White Cliffs in 1805, they were delighted by the enchanted landscape. Meriwether Lewis described 300-foot-tall white sandstone cliffs carved into a thousand different shapes by the vagaries of the waterway. He noted that with the help of a little imagination, it was possible to see lofty buildings and statuary among the cliffs. "A most romantic appearance" was how Lewis described it.

How to sign up:

For Lewis and Clark Trail Heritage Foundation members, the cost is \$1,500; for non-members, \$1,600, which includes a year-long foundation membership. A \$500 non-refundable deposit is due with your RSVP by May 31. Canoeing skills are little cause for concern; beginners are welcome.
